

COZY COCOON SWEATER CROCHET PATTERN



The **Coziest Cocoon Sweater** is made from the softest, squishiest yarn and it's bound to keep you nice and cozy this winter!

Materials

WeCrochet Chroma Twist Bulky in Sandpiper (6/762 yds skeins for S/M, 8 skeins/1,016yds for L/XL, 10 skeins/1,270 yds for 2X/3X)

L/8.0 mm hook

Yarn needle

Scissors

Level

advanced beginner/intermediate

Pattern notes & stitches to know

sl st - slip stitch

ch – chain

hdc - half double crochet

sc - single crochet

TL - third loop - insert hook into the half double crochet third loop and work stitch (horizontal loop on the back of half double crochet)

dc - double crochet

- written in US terms
- ch 2 does not count as hdc
- ch 1 does not count as sc
- This top is made as one rectangle. Then sewn to create a cardigan shape. The sleeves and collar are added last.
- Gauge: 11 hdc x 12 rows alternating hdc & scTL = 4" x 4"

Pattern notes cont.

Sizes:

(S/M, L/XL, 2X/3X) - The pattern is written in these sizes consecutively. Example, when the pattern gives the end of row count ((88, 104, 120) hdc) the 88 is for S/M, 104 is L/XL, and 120 is 2X/3X.

This sweater is a loose fit with some positive ease.

Approx Finished Size:

Width: S/M (31") L/XL (37") 2X/3X (43")

Length: S/M (24") L/XL (26") 2X/3X (28")

Size Small pictured. I am 5'0" with 34" bust

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ch (90, 106, 122)

This is the width from elbow to elbow. Add or take out chains as needed. Any number of chains works.

Row 1: hdc in 3rd ch from the hook and across ((88, 104, 120) hdc)

Row 2: ch 1, turn sc TL in each stitch across ((88, 104, 120) sc)

Row 3: ch 2, turn, hdc in each stitch across ((88, 104, 120) hdc)

Row 4 - Row (70, 76, 82): repeat rows 2 & 3, ending with a row 2 repeat

Or until desired length.

Fasten off. Weave in the ends.

SEWING

Lay your rectangle with the right side up and the rows going horizontal

Fold in half by bring the top down.

Using your yarn needle and a length of yarn twice the length you are going to sew, join at the center of the side then whipstitch down.

Fasten off. Weave in the ends.

Repeat on other side.



The spaces at the top are the armholes. Pull up the top half from the center.

You can see it's starting to look more like a sweater now!

COLLAR

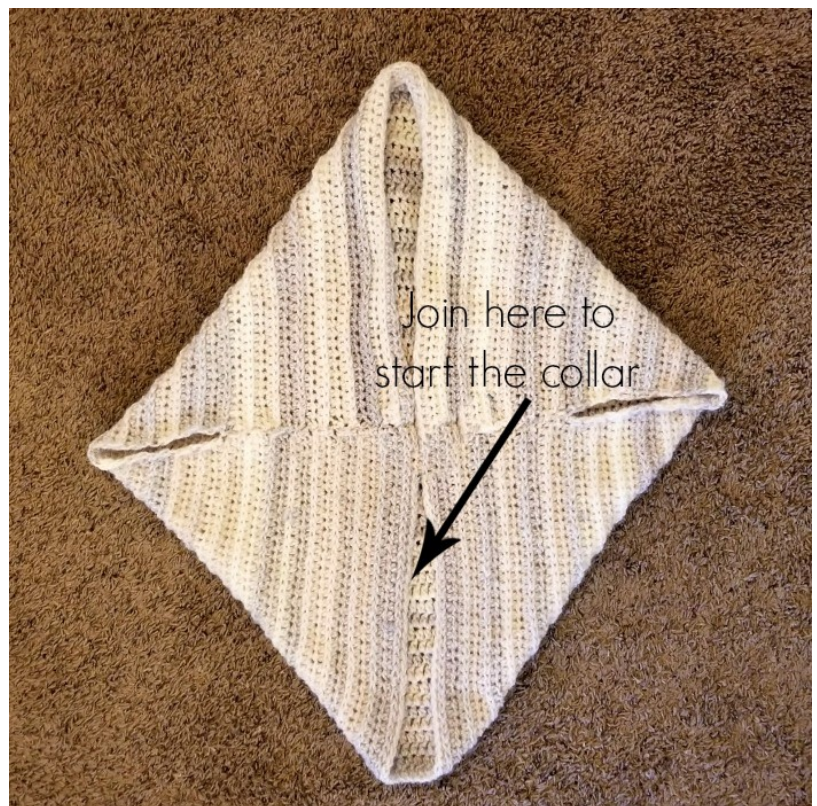
Join yarn approximately 20 stitches from the center seam

Row 1: sl st in 5 stitches, sc in 5 stitches, hdc in 5 stitches, dc in 5 stitches, dc in each stitch around to opposite seam, dc in next 5 stitches, hdc in 5 stitches, sc in 5 stitches, sl st in next 5 stitches

Row 2: ch 1, turn, skip first stitch, sl st in next 4 stitches, sc in next 5, hdc in 5 stitches, dc in each stitch around to hdc, hdc in next 5 stitches, sc in 5 stitches, sl st in 4 stitches

Row 3: ch 1, turn, skip first stitch, sl st in next 3 stitches, sc in next 5, hdc in 5 stitches, dc in each stitch around to hdc, hdc in next 5 stitches, sc in 5 stitches, sl st in 3 stitches

Fasten off. Weave in the ends.



SLEEVES

Join yarn to the bottom of an armhole.

Round 1: ch 1, sc evenly around, working 1 sc in the end of each row, join to first sc with sl st

Round 2: ch 1, sc in each stitch around, join to first sc with sl st

Round 3 - 8: ch 1, sc2tog, sc in each stitch around to last 2, sc2tog, join to first sc with sl st

Fasten off. Weave in the ends.

Repeat for other sleeve.
